There was once a little boy who lived in the country. They had to use an outhouse, which the little boy hated because it was hot in the summer, cold

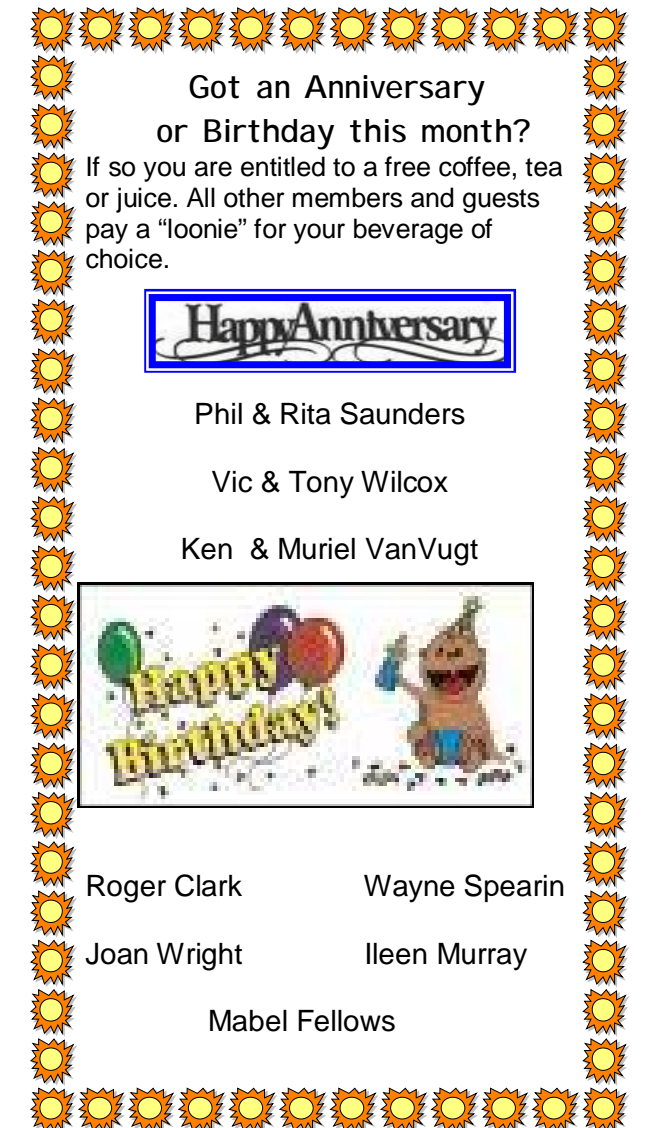
in the winter, and stank all the time. The outhouse was sitting on the bank of a creek and the boy determined that one day he would push that outhouse into the creek.
